Education situation of the migrant children in Thailand

• The Thai Ministry of Education established regulations to provide education for people without civil registration or not having Thai nationality.

• Consistent with the spirit of Cabinet resolution on July 5, 2005, if the migrant children can read and write the Thai language, they can enroll in local primary schools and receive free formal education.

Situation of the migrant children in Bangkok and Tap Ma








If the migrant children can receive education...

- They will be able to understand what Thai people and authority say and issue.
- They will be able to read and write Thai language in their daily life.
- They might be able to continue their education to secondary/ higher education to be skilled worker or to get better jobs.
- They will be accustomed to Thai culture and can live in better harmonization in the society.

Learning Course of Children and Stakeholders



Project Purpose

All four agencies shall **establish a system** for migrant children to apply to study in government educational institutions or Learning Encouragement Centers in the pilot area in Thailand (Bangborn, Bang Khun Thian and Prawet Districts).

The aim of the system is to **appropriately integrate migrant children into the education system** and extend the positive outcomes of the Project to their social integration in other areas.

Activities 1. Support for the organization of seminars and training activities (with DOLE):

- Organize seminars for government officials, educational institutions, parents, and volunteers within the community to enhance understanding of migrant children's rights.
- Organize training for teachers to promote methods for teaching the Thai language before entering the basic education system and curriculum for migrant children.
- 3. Promote the development of a curriculum for the Thai language before entering school

Activities 2. Support for the organization of education and monitoring of operations (with DOLE)

- 1. The Sasakawa Peace Foundation, Nogezaka Glocal, and the JILAF will provide study places and teachers for teaching the Thai language before children enter the education system.
- 2. Promote the provision of learning places and teachers for the basic education curriculum for migrant children.


Activities 3. Project evaluation and monitoring (with all):

- 1. Hold meetings to review progress, report obstacles, evaluate project results, and summarize.
- 2. Organize meetings to exchange experiences and lessons between Thailand and Japan

Activities with Local Administration Authorities and all:

- 1. Training for public officials to establish a Schooling Volunteer system.
- 2. Training to Schooling Volunteers.
- 3. Developing manuals for Schooling Volunteers.
- 4. Schooling Volunteers survey the out-of-school children.
- 5. Seminars for public primary school principals, teachers and Thai parents whose children attending public schools.
- 6. Schooling Volunteers conduct individual visits to the parents of out-ofschool children.
- 7. Experience exchange workshop for the mutual learning of Schooling Volunteers among pilot areas per year. (Joint Coordination Committee Meeting: JCC)
- 8. Extract lessons learned of the education support for foreign roots children in Japan for the utilization in Thailand.
