A long time ago, our ancestors sailed magnificent voyaging canoes in search of adventure wealth, and new frontiers. In due course, they inhabited some of the remotest parts of the world. Times have

changed since then. The once magnificent voyaging canoes are now slowly becoming but icons of the past. But in its place, the ocean that once challenged our ancestors has given us a new identity. The remoteness and small size of our islands offer little room for commercial expansion. Rising sea temperature is destroying marine habitat along with the food source which many islanders depend on. Some move out of the islands in search of education, never to return due to lack of opportunity. These are but a few of the problems we face in our islands. Raising awareness is one thing. Tackling issues with a few heads is another thing. ISA aims to achieve both, and more.
